Bringing Justice to More Nevadans

In 2024, I am celebrating my 35th year as a legal aid attorney! It seems like yesterday when I joined Legal Aid Center of Southern Nevada. What keeps me here? Two things: the clients we help and the opportunity to bring justice to more Nevadans.

Next year, we are undertaking one of the most ambitious expansions in our history. We will commence construction of our new Advocacy & Justice Complex right across the street from our main office. Upon completion of construction, the new complex will be the first statewide service campus where any Nevadan who has experienced the devastating trauma of violent crime can find justice and begin to heal. The growth of the Advocacy & Justice Complex is both exciting and necessary. In little more than a decade, the number of clients we serve annually has nearly quadrupled, from 58,235 in 2012 to 198,999 in 2023.

The new complex will house our Family Justice Project primarily serving victims of domestic violence and human trafficking, the Guardianship Advocacy Project — primarily serving the elderly susceptible to exploitation, and the Resiliency & Justice Center, formerly the Vegas Strong Resiliency Center. The Resiliency Center, awarded the 2021 National Crime Victims Service Award from the Department of Justice

Office for Victims of Crime for its extraordinary work in serving survivors, is a national model showing how to serve survivors of violence. We integrate legal aid, victim navigation, resource connection, and behavioral health services in one Center to promote healing and resiliency and will do so for every survivor of violent crime in our community. We are also prepared to be activated by the Office of Emergency Management at Clark County to help survivors following any incident of mass violence in our community as we were in response to the December 6th UNLV shooting.

It will take all of our staff, pro bono volunteers, funders, and friends to help us accomplish this ambitious expansion. But this new Advocacy & Justice Complex will allow us to move into the future, providing help and hope to those in need. Learn more about this next chapter in Legal Aid Center's journey as well as enjoy reading about all that kept us busy in 2023.


WHAT WE DO HELPING CHILDREN

The **Children's Attorneys Project** (CAP) provides counsel, advice, and representation to abused and neglected children in the foster care system. The attorneys serve as the child's voice in court and in the community allowing the child to take an active role in their own destiny. Our dedicated CAP team handles very tough cases, often involving innocent children with broken bones, who have been sexually abused and are suffering from emotional damage. But our team is buoyed by the fact that they make a difference in the lives of our clients. It is an honor to represent these children.

Children's Attorneys Project (CAP) helped

6,940 children in 2023

526 Adoptions



The Education Advocacy Program,

a program of CAP, provides advice, training, advocacy, and legal representation for children with disabilities who are entitled to special education services under federal and state law. School children represented by the Education Advocacy Program

The **Volunteer Education Advocate Program** trained and supported **86** volunteers who helped **304** school children get the education supports they needed to be successful in school.

Minor Guardianship Program

Legal Aid Center launched our Minor Guardianship Program in early 2020, and we discovered the need was greater than we knew. Minor guardianship attorneys represent their clients using a multi-disciplinary approach, working closely with attorneys from other units to capitalize on institutional knowledge of children's law, family law, and immigration.

Our new Minor Guardianship Program celebrated its third full year of operations. In 2023, the team handled **982** cases. Pro bono attorneys represented another **62** minor guardianship clients.



LETTER FROM A FORMER CAP CLIENT TO HIS CAP ATTORNEY

From the moment I found myself in foster care, I felt like a fragile fledgling, without purpose and afraid of the world. But my team became the feathers that sheltered and protected me, providing warmth, security, and a sense of belonging. Your unwavering support formed a comforting shield around me, protecting me from the harsh winds of uncertainty and fear.

Just as a bird's feathers are intricate and diverse, so too are the roles each of you played in my life. Like vibrant and colorful plumes, you all have diligently worked with coordinating my care, advocating for my rights, and ensuring that I found a safe home. You provided the sturdy foundation upon which my wings could spread and grow. You were the feathers of wisdom and healing, guiding me through the storms of trauma and pain. With your compassionate guidance, you taught me how to mend my broken wings, instilling in me the resilience and strength needed to overcome adversity. Your presence provided the necessary balance and stability for my flight.

As I sit here today, reflecting on my journey, I am filled with profound gratitude for each feather my team has provided, and each wing you all have strengthened. You have given me the gift of flight, of independence, and hope.

Once more, thank you all for equipping me with the power to navigate the winds of life, to embrace the unknown with courage and determination.

Two young boys contacted their grandparents after they were abandoned by their mother at a local hospital. The grandparents rushed to pick up the boys. They called CPS for abandonment and abuse. They filed a Petition for Temporary and General Guardianship to be able to take care of the boys, particularly because one of their grandsons has a debilitating, high-risk medical condition that requires daily care and regular doctor's visits. Without a guardianship, they would be unable to get their grandson the life-saving immediate care he needed. In their temporary guardianship petition, they included a letter from a specialist that explained the extreme and emergent need for medical care that the grandparents could not get without the temporary guardianship.

All of this was presented to the court. Despite medical emergency and evidence presented, the district court denied the temporary guardianship. The court also appointed counsel for the minors, which meant that the boys had a Legal Aid Center attorney who reviewed the record and determined that the district court made an error in denying the temporary guardianship. The boys' Legal Aid Center attorney drafted an Emergency Petition for Writ of Mandamus with the Nevada Supreme Court. In a unanimous decision, the Nevada Supreme Court granted the Petition for Writ of Mandamus and directed the district court to issue the requested temporary guardianship. Because of our work, the child was able to access the medical care he needs to avoid a life-threatening emergency.

WHAT WE DO PROTECTING SENIORS

Legal Aid Center provides direct representation, counsel, and advice to seniors through our Consumer Rights Project on legal issues from predatory lending, real estate, fraud, probate, social security appeals, mobile home issues, immigration, bankruptcy, and unlawful auto sales and mechanic work.

The **Guardianship Advocacy Project** provides direct representation to seniors and adults facing or are under a guardianship. The Project is on the forefront of a changing area of law and is helping to shape and enforce meaningful protections for those otherwise unable to protect themselves.

4,218 protected persons were helped through our Guardianship Advocacy Project in 2023. Legal Aid Center guardianship attorneys worked on **3,147** cases and pro bono attorneys represented an additional **27** people.

In 2023

- 16% of our represented clients were over 60 years old.
- Our oldest client was 102.
- Legal Aid Center guardianship attorneys recovered \$833,906 of our clients' misappropriated assets.

The Project continued to make strides in our Outreach Program, educating seniors in our community about how they can avoid court ordered guardianship. We also continued to engage with our younger community, teaching them and their families how to create Powers of Attorney and Supported Decision Making Agreements as a way to avoid unnecessary guardianship.



Maggie, an elderly woman, found herself in the hospital after a fall. Once recovered, Maggie wanted to go home, but the hospital refused to let her go home. Maggie was worried about Micki, her dog, and she missed her terribly. Maggie asked her Legal Aid Center attorney to help her go home. Maggie's attorney fought the facility and showed that there was no medical reason for Maggie to remain in a facility. When Maggie got home, Micki was waiting for her. There were smiles, tears, and tail wagging!



WHAT WE DO GIVING VICTIMS OF VIOLENCE A LEGAL LIFELINE

In 2023, the **Family Justice Project**, (FJP), provided direct services to **3,186** people.

The Family Justice Project provides a wide range of representation to victims of domestic violence. Our attorneys appear at hearings to extend protective orders, assist with divorce and custody issues, and represent victims of crime who have civil and family law problems that are a result of their victimization. Beyond the courtroom, the staff provides, in English and Spanish:

- Community Legal Education Classes
- On-site direct representation to applicants at Safe Nest applying for initial TPO hearings to improve outcomes for survivors of domestic violence
- Weekly Ask-A-Lawyer sessions
- The Legal Aid Center Pro Bono Project places family law cases with pro bono attorneys in addition to those accepted by FJP
- Trial preparation class for pro se litigants

The Immigration Advocacy Project provided direct legal representation to 2,903 immigrant victims of violence, sexual assault, DACA recipients, asylum seekers, and others facing humanitarian crises.

- Legal Aid Center of Southern Nevada was able to assist 148 refugees from Afghanistan.
- Legal Aid Center staff represented 124 refugees and our pro bono attorneys helped 24 refugees.

Human Trafficking

Nevada is ranked #1 in states with the highest number of victims of human trafficking. Legal Aid Center helps survivors of human trafficking tackle a multitude of challenges in recovery including:



DEFENDING VICTIMS OF FRAUD AND UNLAWFUL BEHAVIOR

The **Consumer Rights Project** fights to protect low-income consumers in Southern Nevada from threats to their economic security and advocates on behalf of individuals threatened or victimized by deceptive business practices, illegal or abusive debt collection efforts, predatory and high-interest lending, and other harmful businesses, frauds, and scams that threaten the basic financial wellbeing and stability of vulnerable Nevadans. The Housing team is fighting to keep seniors, working families, and individuals with disabilities in their homes. Nevada's severe shortage of affordable homes is leaving people desperate and distraught, facing eviction, garnishment, and other stressors.

LEGAL SERVICES FUND

In 2023, the Legal Services Fund team provided invaluable assistance navigating the impenetrable bureaucracy to protect Culinary and Bartenders Union members from unfair treatment. Attorneys and staff also helped union members with more traditional legal assistance, including estate planning and immigration.

Rosa is disabled with chronic pain, living on Social Security benefits of less than \$1000 a month. Rosa sought help from Legal Aid Center because she was concerned that she was the victim of a predatory lending scheme.

Rosa couldn't afford to pay the full balance for repairs needed for her car. The mechanic shop suggested applying to ABC Finance so she could make monthly payments. Rosa was approved in March 2023. Her payments were \$300 a month, which was about 1/3 of her monthly income. Seven months later, Rosa was struggling to make the monthly payments and didn't understand how she hadn't paid off the repairs yet.

Rosa was up to date on her monthly payments when she requested legal help. A Legal Aid Center attorney recognized the finance company and knew that this finance company focused on lease-purchase agreements, which means Rosa would pay for months and months, and when the amount was paid off, the Company would either demand the items financed back, or demand a purchase price for the items financed. In this case, the leased items were, "Auto Repair."

How was Rosa supposed to give back auto repair if she couldn't afford to pay the price ABC Finance would demand? Auto repair is a non-tangible service with no residual value. The Legal Aid Center attorney explained the lease-purchase agreement to Rosa. He stated that the agreement was disguised financing and not a true lease. Rosa's Legal Aid Center attorney contacted ABC Finance company's in-house counsel and explained his findings. The finance company's attorney reviewed the client's contract and agreed to settle Rosa's case.

Rosa is now free from the payments. She is happy with the outcome and thrilled to be able to afford a heating pad to ease her pain – something she had been putting off due to her financial obligations to ABC Finance.

LEGAL EMERGENCY ROOMS



Our **Self-Help Centers** are "legal emergency rooms" for pro se litigants navigating the court system. The Centers provide an environment where walk-in customers, often with urgent legal issues, can request legal information regardless of their income, assets, or citizenship.

- □ The Self-Help Centers served a record number of people in 2023 over 156,007!
- □ The Civil Law Self-Help Center assisted 69,025 people averaging 5,750 people per month and over 280 people a day.
 - Online eviction litigation forms were created so both landlords and tenants can complete forms and file them electronically.
- The Family Law Self-Help Center assisted 86,982 people averaging 7,249 people per month and over **335** people a day.
 - 9,504 individuals sough assistance for a domestic violence protection order issue and the staff helped 4,373 people with protection order applications.
 - The Center partnered with the Nevada Supreme Court Law Library to translate nearly **50** of the most commone family law forms into Spanish, Tagalog, and Mandarin.

THE VEGAS STRONG RESILIENCY CENTER, NOW THE RESILIENCY & JUSTICE CENTER



The **Resiliency & Justice Center** is a multi-agency resource and referral center dedicated to serving survivors of violent crime across Nevada. The Center is staffed by knowledgeable and caring professionals to help the "whole" person in their recovery journey.

The services include

- Free Legal Advice On victim's rights, guidance for traumatized and grieving spouses, probate and guardianship issues, and advocacy in dealing with insurance questions.
- Victims of Crime Program (VOCP) Expediting compensation forms and U-visa applications for victims of crimes outside the United States, including domestic violence and human trafficking survivors.
- Mental Health Navigation State mental health experts provide navigation finding a trauma-trained therapist to work with the survivor on a long-term basis.
- Court & Government Bureaucracy Pushing back against bureaucracy, appealing denials, and fighting for the rights of the voiceless.

In 2023

- Assisted 3,580 survivors of violent crime.
- The Center was awarded the prestigious Congressional Crime Survivors and Justice Caucus Allied Professional Award as the country continues to look to the Resiliency Center as a national model for victim services.
- The Resiliency Center was activated for several mass incidents in 2023: the extensive flooding in Mount Charleston in August that left hundreds displaced; a mass shooting on the campus of UNLV in December that left three beloved faculty members dead and one severely injured; and several apartment complex arson fires. The preparation and continued collaboration between the Resiliency & Justice Center and its community partners ensured that the survivors of these tragedies had somewhere to turn for assistance.

The Resiliency & Justice Center provides comprehensive assistance to survivors of violent crime and responds to any mass violence incident in our community. The Resiliency Center received the 2021 Department of Justice Service Award for its model of assistance and the 2023 Congressional Crime Survivor's Award.

Thomas was brutally attacked three times within a two-month period at the behest of his estranged wife. He was brutally stabbed in three separate incidents and the attacks left him disabled and homeless. Thomas was eligible to file a Victims of Crime Program application, but he was struggling with understanding the process due to the disabling attacks. Thomas was left with no money and homeless. His cell phone was about to be turned off, further restricting his ability to get assistance. He was also still legally married and feared the attacks would continue until they ended his life.

The Victims of Crime Program (VOCP) connected Thomas to the Resiliency Center. Thomas' advocate worked with the VOCP office to obtain the benefits he qualified for and then his advocate helped him obtain his medical bills. The advocate then connected Thomas with Southern Nevada Center for Independent Living for housing solutions and assistance with disability benefits. Lastly, Thomas' advocate connected him with Legal Aid Center of Southern Nevada's Family Justice Project for pro bono assistance with a divorce.

Thomas was able to move into a weekly rental immediately, with his basic household goods kit to help him get set up. His new cell phone enabled him to communicate and advocate for himself while applying for disability benefits. His pro bono attorney is working on his divorce proceedings. Thomas is looking forward to a new life, free from violence.



Community Justice Fellowship

The Community Justice Fellowship, sponsored by Paul Padda Law since 2019, is a one-year fellowship for a law school graduate who wants to work in a public interest law firm and learn how the top legal aid in Nevada provides over 198,000 services a year. A New Legacy

Every 38 minutes, someone experiences a violent crime in Nevada. Despite this statistic, for many years, Nevada offered virtually no services to assist survivors of violent crime. Then October 1, 2017 happened. A comprehensive victim assistance center, the Vegas Strong Resiliency Center, was born.

Six years later, the Vegas Strong Resiliency Center rebranded as the Resiliency & Justice Center. Its mission has been expanded to serve all survivors of violent crime in Nevada, whether the crime involves one person or a thousand.

More than 3,500 victims of violent crime and their families sought assistance at the Resiliency & Justice Center in 2023. This consistent and urgent need has led us to this decision to grow and to serve all survivors of violent crime across the state, whether the tragedy affects one family or thousands. We need a home campus for survivors, not multiple locations. It is for this reason that we are constructing an Advocacy & Justice Complex where any Nevadan who has experienced the devastating trauma of violent crime can find justice and begin to heal.

Bringing Justice to More Nevadans

Legal Aid Center of Southern Nevada's Advocacy & Justice Complex will house three critical Projects:

- The Family Justice Project, which represents survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault and human trafficking.
- Legal Aid Center of Southern Nevada's Resiliency & Justice Center, which helps all victims of crime in Nevada.
- The Guardianship Advocacy Project, which prevents exploitation of the elderly and children in guardianship matters.
